Dear FaithWorks Coordinator:

Thank you for accepting this important ministry in the life of our diocese. As the annual appeal of the Diocese of Toronto, FaithWorks provides life-giving witness that ***We who are many are one body*** (1 Cor 10.17). Through your efforts, and the generosity of many, many people, FaithWorks has raised more than \$23 million since it was created in 1996.

How does FaithWorks help?

FaithWorks allows us to come together with our sisters and brothers across the diocese to share our blessings with those who are in need in local communities and around the world. FaithWorks supports 18 Ministry Partners, helping people like Rick, who is no longer homeless and now gives back to his community because the David Busby Centre was there to help him get back on his feet when he had nowhere else to turn. FaithWorks supports the downtown ministry of All Saints Church Community Centre and its outreach to help women recover from life on the streets as sex-trade workers. FaithWorks is the warm welcome that newcomers receive when they become part of Flemingdon Park Ministry. FaithWorks funds the crisis intervention and wraparound support provided to vulnerable women and children in rural communities through the ministry of North House. FaithWorks also supports the essential work being done around the world and in Canada's North by the Anglican Church of Canada and the Primate's World Relief and Development Fund. FaithWorks also provides funds to support the outreach ministry of your parish. Each parish is entitled to retain up to 15% of what it raises through FaithWorks each year. Last year alone, funds raised through FaithWorks parish campaigns contributed \$87,565 in support of outreach projects at the local parish level. In addition, 5% of undesignated contributions are distributed each year in the form of Area Ministry Grants.

In all of these ways, by supporting FaithWorks your parish is reaching out to serve those in need locally, across the diocese, and throughout the developing world.

In 2013 we exceeded our fund-raising goal of \$1.55 million for the first time ever. With your help, we can reach even higher this year to ensure that our Ministry Partners have the resources they need to be strong and healthy. To assist your parish in its fundraising efforts, we suggest that you set a FaithWorks goal of approximately 5% of your 2013 offerings. Many parishes already are giving beyond this recommended guideline and many others are easily within reach.

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What's new in 2014?

We are pleased to welcome three new ministries to the FaithWorks family in 2014. Transition House Coalition of Northumberland; St. John the Baptist, Lakefield, After-School Program; and St. John the Evangelist, Peterborough Community Outreach Ministries are helping to increase the FaithWorks presence in Trent-Durham Area. If resources permit, these ministries will be eligible to receive core funding in 2017.

In 2011, Diocesan Council approved changes to the FaithWorks funding formula, to ensure that FaithWorks continues to be a significant and reliable source of revenue for ministries helping those in need throughout our Diocese and around the world.

We have eliminated the distinction between “Community Ministries” and “Partners.” The new designation, “FaithWorks Ministry Partners”, is a more accurate description of role of these agencies play in building and nurturing communities of hope and compassion throughout our Diocese and around the world.

It is no longer necessary to designate gifts in support of the Anglican Appeal, LOFT Community Services, and the Primate's World Relief and Development Fund. This requirement had previously been a source of misunderstanding and, from the perspective of these ministries, placed an undue burden on their ability to build awareness and raise funds throughout our diocese. Since 2012, all of our FaithWorks Ministry Partners have received a share of the total amount of undesignated contributions raised through FaithWorks.

Donors who have a particular interest in supporting the work of any of our Ministry Partners may still choose to designate their gift. These designated contributions will be counted as “first dollars in” toward the total allocation amount. The FaithWorks 2014 Parish Campaign Report has been revised to reflect these changes. 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Tips for a Successful Parish Campaign

Printed Materials

Brochures, pledge forms, bulletin covers, posters, bookmarks and placemats help to promote FaithWorks in your parish. FaithWorks parish materials are distributed each year in January. If you would prefer to have materials sent to you closer to the date that you plan to conduct your FaithWorks campaign, please let us know and we will be happy to make those arrangements. When the materials arrive, put up the posters and ensure that FaithWorks materials are distributed to everyone in the parish.

Ask your parish administrator to use the FaithWorks bulletin covers on Sundays when you have a speaker from any of our Ministry Partners.

Speakers Bureau

Would you like to know how your dollars are making a difference? Contact the FaithWorks Speakers Bureau to request a speaker from one of our FaithWorks Ministry Partners. A gifted, motivated speaker can put a human face on the work you are helping to support and this can have a significant impact on giving. Parishes that arranged a speaker through the Speakers' Bureau have experienced, on average, increases of 20% or more over the previous year. Offertory Envelopes and Giving by PAR

Parishes that encourage monthly donations to FaithWorks consistently rank among the highest in proportional giving. This is because it is easier for most of us to give a small amount each month than to write a big cheque once a year. Even a modest contribution of just \$5 a month adds up to \$60 a year!

FaithWorks pays the cost of printing and inserting FaithWorks envelopes (one per month) in the offertory boxed sets ordered from your regular envelope provider. An order form can be downloaded from our website, www.faithworks.ca.

Increasingly, parishioners are giving to their parish through PAR (pre-authorized remittance). Please encourage them to consider a small increase each month to help support FaithWorks.

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Throughout the year

Keep parishioners informed by providing short updates in your parish bulletin, such as last year's parish results, progress on this year's campaign, upcoming events, etc. Don't forget to mention that by retaining 15% of the funds you raise, FaithWorks is helping to support your parish's own outreach ministry. Check the website (www.faithworks.ca) for profiles of FaithWorks ministries and stories of some of the people who have been helped through the generosity of people like you.

Reporting and Remitting Donations

Please remit donations on a quarterly basis. Submitting your donations throughout the year will make it possible for the FaithWorks Allocations Committee to make better informed grant-making decisions and will help to ensure that recipient ministries receive funds on a timely basis.

The FaithWorks 2014 Parish Campaign Report should be submitted at the same time you send your quarterly remittances. This form helps to ensure that you receive full credit for the money you have raised and that designated contributions reach their intended ministry. A copy of this form can be found on the last two pages of this manual. The Parish Campaign Reporting Form also can be downloaded from www.faithworks.ca (as an excel workbook or a PDF version that can be printed out and filled in).

IMPORTANT, PLEASE NOTE: In order for contributions to be credited to your parish for FaithWorks 2014, **we must receive your final Campaign Report no later than January 5, 2015.** Any outstanding funds can be remitted, along with a copy of your final report, up until January 16, 2015.

Remittances

Remittance cheques should be made out to "Diocese of Toronto – FaithWorks" and mailed or delivered to Diocese of Toronto Stewardship Development Office, 135 Adelaide St. E., Toronto, ON M5C 1L8.

Donations by Visa and MasterCard

Send donor cards for Visa and MasterCard payments directly to the Stewardship Development Office. Remember to include these payments on your quarterly FaithWorks Campaign Report. The Stewardship Development Office will produce tax receipts and credit these donations to your parish.

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Pre-Authorized Giving

Parishioners who use Pre-Authorized Giving (PAR) may designate a portion of their gift to FaithWorks or any of the Ministry Partners. The parish will be asked to record the FaithWorks amounts contributed in this manner on the quarterly Campaign Report.

Multiple Contributions

Have you considered encouraging your parishioners to contribute to FaithWorks throughout the year? Parishes that encourage multiple contributions experience significantly higher donations than those parishes not using this simple system. This is because most of us give only what we can afford at the time of the appeal. But even a modest contribution, multiplied on a weekly, monthly or even quarterly basis quickly adds up. And it also helps to remind us of the important work being done day in and day out by FaithWorks ministries and partners.

Parish Retainer

Your parish is entitled to retain 15% of undesignated contributions raised through your FaithWorks Campaign. Please note that the parish should not calculate a retainer on funds submitted directly to one of our ministry partners in response to an urgent appeal (such as disaster response or relief).

ALL SAINTS CHURCH - COMMUNITY CENTRE, Toronto

“Come to Me, all you who labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest.” These words from Matthew’s Gospel, 11:28, articulate the essence of what we are trying to accomplish on behalf of the Anglican Diocese of Toronto in the marginalized neighbourhood surrounding Dundas Street East and Sherbourne Street in Toronto. “And what does the Lord require of you but to do justice and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God” (Micah 6:8). All Saints Church-Community Centre is committed to being the presence and voice of Micah, sharing the teachings of Jesus of Nazareth via the Church Site Drop-in Centre, the Dan Harrison Public Housing Drop-in, the Friday Female Sex Trade Worker’s Drop-In, the Clergy Street Ministry, the Social Work Initiative, and the Take This Bread bakery. The Parish of All Saints, its Advisory Board, and its Community Centre staff members work with, pray with, and advocate on behalf of the economically disenfranchised in our midst.

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THE ANGLICAN APPEAL

The Anglican Appeal supports mission work and ministry in Canada's North and with our church partners overseas. In Northern Canada, where 15% of the country's population is dispersed across 85% of its space, ministering to isolated parishes is difficult. Your support invests in the education of approximately 50 clergy and lay leaders each year to serve the region. It also provides leadership training, worship materials in indigenous languages, and online church curriculum.

ANGLICAN UNITED REFUGEE ALLIANCE (AURA)

Around the world, countless refugees have been forced to flee their homeland, their lives threatened by persecution. AURA brings refugees to Canada where they can get a fresh start under the care of faith communities. Working with the Diocese and the Toronto Conference of the United Church, AURA matches UN Convention refugees with parishes and congregations.

For over 25 years, AURA has been an essential resource for parishes as they begin the often overwhelming process of helping refugees start over in a new country. AURA arranges for private sponsorship of refugee families, facilitates the application process, advocates with the federal government and assists parishes with settlement issues after the refugees arrive.

Parishes regularly work together with other churches in their local areas to sponsor refugee families. More than 50 parishes are currently sponsoring refugees.

THE BRIDGE PRISON MINISTRY, Brampton

The focus of The BRIDGE is on building relationships with inmates and ex-inmates in which acceptance, friendship and trust can develop and nurture human wholeness. Our hope is that the community so built will be a supportive foundation from which these individuals can find their way safely into the greater community, becoming useful, law-abiding, whole members of society. Within correctional institutions we provide programming that encourages residents to work through personal negative attitudes and areas of brokenness that have led them into sub-culture and criminal behavior, and to help them to find alternative healthier attitudes and lifestyles. We do this by teaching and providing opportunities for them to learn to be open and the start building trust in relationships, beginning with each other, our community volunteers and eventually with society itself.

Within the community we walk with the offender as they struggle to re-integrate back into a sometimes frightening and unwelcome community. We do this by developing solid partnerships with numerous community and social service agencies; providing direct support holding the men accountable for their circumstances and their behaviours; advocating for offenders and educating and supporting the community at large.

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COUCHICHING JUBILEE HOUSE, Orillia

Couchiching Jubilee House is more than a roof – it is the foundation of friendships and a brighter future.

Since 2001, Jubilee House has created a supportive, family-like community for 72 women and 75 children. We aim to provide women and their dependent children with affordable and safe transitional housing for up to a year. We support these women in meeting goals they have set based on their personal strengths and motivation for change, and help them access the community services they need and want, such as Ontario Works, ODSP, education grants and rent subsidies, training and employment opportunities. The key to our success is in helping each woman to establish a personal support system to help them accomplish their goals. Their support system could include family and / or friends, community support workers including social workers and doctors, Jubilee House staff and volunteer mentors. After they have moved on to safe and secure housing in the community, the post resident program helps women stay connected.

In 2013 we celebrated a number of successes, as two of our current residents returned to school; one post resident completed her college degree. Another post resident flew from Western Canada to Orillia for a mini reunion with volunteers and staff. This woman is now the chief payroll clerk and second in command at the firm where she works. One of our current residents delivered a healthy baby girl and, beginning in January 2014, our residents have been given the opportunity to take a university-level course, “Humanities 101.”

THE DAM, Mississauga

The Dam is a safe community for youth and young moms offering love, respect and dignity for all. Through the relationship we form we Develop, Assist and Mentor youth and young moms along the journey towards reaching their full potential.

The Dam’s two drop-in centres in Meadowvale and Cooksville welcome as many as 600 youth each year. Our community outreach programs include interactions with youth in the Meadowvale Town Centre complex, basketball program, speaking engagements and the True Rebel Blog (www.true rebel.ca). In addition, we are providing a safe and nurturing community to 27 young moms and 14 children.

We wanted to understand the impact that The Dam is making on the lives of our youth and young moms, so we asked them. 72% of our youth reported that they have experienced significant growth in their ability to form healthy relationships and 69% reported a significant increase in positive behaviours regarding substance use, setting and working toward goals, and being helpful to others. Nine out of ten youth have gotten more involved in the community, whether through school activities, volunteering, or social activism, and more than half of these youth report a significant

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increase in these areas. And although adolescence can be very trying time, nine in ten youth felt better about themselves as a result of their involvement in The Dam.

THE DAVID BUSBY STREET CENTRE, Barrie

The David Busby Street Centre is a drop-in centre in downtown Barrie designed to provide a safe environment for people who are homeless or at-risk of homelessness; people who are socially isolated; as well as low-income families, youth and seniors. The Centre focuses on reducing the impact of poverty, homelessness, insufficient employment, addiction and mental health issues through outreach and services to participants throughout Simcoe County.

In 2012 over 2,300 unique individuals visited the drop-in centre, seeking refuge from the streets, shelters and inadequate housing. The drop-in serves over 78,000 cups of coffee each year. The official government plan indicates that Simcoe County's population will double in the next quarter century. Currently, the Centre sees an average of 125-150 participants a day, and we anticipate that the need for our services will continue to grow.

In addition to the services provide at the Drop-In Centre, an outreach van delivers emergency food and supplies to the working poor. It's the only service of its kind in Simcoe County, with many success stories to its credit.

THE DOWNSVIEW YOUTH COVENANT, Toronto

The Downsview Youth Covenant (DYC) is a Christian ministry serving a densely populated immigrant community comprising a large number of single parents, the majority of whom are women living on very low incomes. DYC affirms children and youth ages 6 to 24 by providing them with guidance, positive role models and activities that will enhance their lives.

FLEMINGDON PARK MINISTRY, Don Mills

Flemingdon Park Ministry is a Christian presence in the world's most diverse community. It seeks and serves Christ in all people by ministering to the spiritual, emotional and physical needs of those who are poor and marginalized – including single mothers, those living in subsidized Metro housing units, and the longer-term unemployed on Ontario Works or Ontario Disability Support Programs. It serves a diverse multi-faith and multi-cultural community of 27,000 people who speak 90 different first languages and represent 130 different ethnic groups.

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Its programs and partnerships include a busy Drop-In, Seniors' and Women's groups, After-School programs, and Food & Friendship Nights. The STAR Project offers a transformative process for job seekers. With more than 10,000 visits each year, Flemington Park Ministry empowers this unique community to access its dreams.

LOFT COMMUNITY SERVICES

LOFT provides permanent housing and community services for the most vulnerable, including those with mental health and physical and addiction challenges, the homeless, the abused and the abandoned. Our services include supportive housing and community support services, and respond to the changing needs of our diverse community.

The name LOFT stands for "Leap of Faith Together," and refers to the organization's approach of taking risks and reaching out in response to unmet and emerging need. We believe we make our best contribution to the community when we not only continue to provide our core services, but also identify gaps in existing services and develop programs in response.

Last year alone, LOFT helped more than 4,000 people with tremendous challenges build lives with dignity. It operates over 70 housing sites across the GTA and York Region including one of North America's few high support residences for homeless people with addictions, mental health conditions and HIV. LOFT is the largest provider of supportive housing to seniors with mental health challenges and/or addictions, and assists homeless people in conflict with the law. LOFT operates Toronto's first supportive housing programs for vulnerable older adults and seniors living in public housing apartment buildings, a high percentage of whom are new Canadians experiencing the stresses of cultural dislocation. It also offers subsidized supportive, respite and palliative housings for HIV + individuals aged 16 and older who are living with HIV or AIDS in combination with mental health and addiction issues, other physical health challenges, and histories of homelessness.

LOFT is mandated to service within the boundaries of the Diocese. Programs are currently located in Toronto, York Region, and South Simcoe region.

NORTH HOUSE SHELTER, North Durham Region

Homelessness in rural Ontario is an invisible problem and in north Durham, one family becomes homeless every day of the year. North House provides services in Brock, Scugog and Uxbridge Townships including the parishes of Uxbridge, Goodwood, Beaverton, Cannington, Sunderland, Port Perry, Greenbank, Blackstock and parts of Kawartha Lakes (Lindsay rural area).

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We are neighbours caring for our neighbours in the spirit of volunteerism and healthy communities. On a case-by-case basis, we assist people of all ages who are in need of longer-term housing solutions and support services. We provide a circle of hope that offers transitional housing and the coordination of services that will give our participants a chance to create positive change in their lives. We help people get a fresh start by breaking the cycle of homelessness and hopelessness. We do this by focusing on the strengths of those who seek our help, enabling them to create positive change in their lives.

At times, we all need a helping hand, not a hand out, to enable us to get back on our feet.

PHILIP AZIZ CENTRE

The Philip Aziz Centre is a community-based non-profit hospice providing respite, practical, physical, emotional and spiritual support for adults, children and families living with the challenges of a life-limiting illness. Staff and volunteers strive to deliver with excellence, compassionate and skilled care that is always respectful of people's beliefs, choices, faith and culture, and promotes dignity, hope and life lived fully to the end. Care is provided in the home, in collaboration with other involved health care professionals. All services are free of charge and delivered through a small professional staff team and over 250 trained volunteers. Philip Aziz Centre volunteers and staff walk with people as they explore their feelings and fears, plan their legacies, and strengthen themselves for the journey ahead.

FaithWorks funding supports the Spiritual Care Program which includes a monthly Spiritual Care Group and full Chaplaincy. In 2013 the Centre provided spiritual care to over 104 clients living with HIV/AIDS.

THE PRIMATE'S WORLD RELIEF AND DEVELOPMENT FUND

As an instrument of faith, PWRDF connects Anglicans in Canada to communities around the world in dynamic partnerships to advance development, to respond to emergencies, to assist refugees, and to act for positive change. PWRDF is engaged in development and relief work in 17 countries around the world, including Canada. It facilitates public engagement and advocacy through a volunteer network active in 30 Anglican dioceses across Canada.

All of PWRDF's programs work toward a "truly just, healthy and peaceful world." PWRDF works with international partners to address the root causes of poverty and injustice; builds strong communities and healthy ecosystems; works for refugee protection and peace building, as well as human rights advocacy and emergency response and rehabilitation. PWRDF carries out its work through partnerships built on shared values, mutual accountability, transparency and solidarity.

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SAMARITAN HOUSE COMMUNITY MINISTRIES, Simcoe County

Since 2001 Samaritan House Community Ministries has walked with families through poverty, abuse, mental health and learning challenges. Transitional Safe Housing and programs provide women and children recovering from abuse with accommodation for up to one year to help restart their lives.

The Samaritan House Resource Centre and community programs serve more than 1,500 people each year. Services include a Drop-In Centre where families get the care they need and where they can access clothing and household items. Job Training and Job Search Services are offered in the Resource Centre to help adults find work. Samaritan House also runs a popular Children's Literacy Program, with dedicated tutors at two schools in Barrie and Angus, as well as a Children's Sponsorship Program that provides financial support to address urgent emotional, psychological or physical health related issues such as short-term counseling, vision care, dental, etc.

ST. JOHN THE BAPTIST, LAKEFIELD, AFTER-SCHOOL PROGRAM

The After-School Program is a partnership between St. John the Baptist and Youth Unlimited, Lakefield (a satellite ministry of Kawartha Youth Unlimited). Its objectives are two-fold: 1) to provide regional school-aged children, in grade 2-8, with opportunity to practice and acquire numeracy and literacy skills within an interactive, nurturing environment through the use of adult mentoring, social interaction and supervised games / play. 2) to allow children to be introduced to Christian faith principles through an interactive discussion group that encourages exploration of Jesus, introduction to the Bible, and questioning in a non-threatening and non-judgmental environment.

The program meets on Tuesdays throughout the school year from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. The program is currently operating at capacity, with 60 youth enrolled. All youth, regardless of faith practice, are welcome to attend. The program serves the Village of Lakefield and the Townships of Selwyn and Douro-Dummer.

ST. JOHN'S COMMUNITY OUTREACH MINISTRIES, Peterborough

The mission of St. John's Community Outreach Ministries is to serve those in Peterborough who live in poverty by meeting their immediate needs, advocating for systemic change, and breaking down the boundaries that exclude people living in poverty from the rest of the community.

We provide pastoral care to visitors to the Lighthouse Community Centre, a drop-in centre run in the basement of St. John's from Monday – Saturday by Canadian Mental Health. As is the case with many drop-in centres, attendance is heavily dependent upon the weather and can range from 60 –

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160 visitors per day. St. John's organizes a community meal served every Saturday to guests of the Lighthouse, many of whom are on ODSP, Ontario Works and the working poor.

Other programs offered include an arts and recreation program for guests of the Lighthouse; community drumming group; and a cooking program run in collaboration with the John Howard Society that partners at-risk youth in grades 9-12 with youth from St. John's parish. Along with the preparation of healthy and nutritious meals, the purpose of this program is to provide the opportunity for youth who would not normally interact at school, to get to know each other, build relationships, and break down barriers.

TORONTO URBAN NATIVE MINISTRY, Toronto

The Toronto Urban Native Ministry (TUNM) seeks to provide Christian pastoral and spiritual care, integrated with First Nations teachings and traditions, for Aboriginal people in Toronto, and to foster healing and right relations between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people.

Founded in 2003, TUNM touches more than 7,500 lives each year. It reaches out to aboriginal people on the street, in hospitals, in jails, shelters, and hostels, providing counselling, spiritual care, and referrals to community services.

TUNM plays an important role in sacred gatherings of aboriginal people, performing baptisms, weddings, funerals to sharing circles, spirit naming and feasts. TUNM is deeply involved in the Truth and Reconciliation process, helping to facilitate the reconciliation process between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal peoples.

TRANSITION HOUSE COALITION OF NORTHUMBERLAND

Everyone needs shelter and security in order to reach their full potential and participate in their communities. Transition House is a local solution to meeting basic housing needs and assisting our residents by providing the tools and resources they need to live full and meaningful lives.

Transition House recognizes when people do not have shelter, many aspects of life are effected and it becomes difficult to manage day to day activities. Transition House aims to ensure our residents' needs are met through our staff and volunteers, and by bringing in community agencies and organizations in a holistic approach.

Transition House serves to meet basic human needs, reducing demand on community resources and assist residents to make decisions for their long term benefit.

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Offering housing for up to 3 months, residents must participate in the programs provided by Transition House and at the same time, they are supported through an action plan which supports their housing needs, income support, money management and other identified goals.
