1. Advocacy Campaigns

• Social Justice Vestry Motion on Affordable Housing & Homelessness

February is Vestry month! Archbishop Colin has asked all parishes in the Diocese to consider supporting this year's social justice vestry motion on affordable housing and homelessness. • "Give it Up for the Earth" Lent postcard campaign from CPJ

Citizens for Public Justice is launching its second annual "Give it Up for the Earth" Lent postcard campaign, calling on the federal government to end fossil fuel subsidies. You are invited to consider an action to take throughout Lent to reduce your own climate impact. Fill out the pledge form and the attached (postage pre-paid) postcard, detach the postcard, and send it to CPJ by April 12, 2018. • Bill C-262 debate and vote Feb. 5 and 7

Last year's Vestry Motion called on the federal government to adopt and implement the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Persons, as recommended in Call to Action

of the Truth & Reconciliation Commission of Canada. Private Member's Bill C-262, which would compel the government to implement the UN Declaration over the next two decades, moved to Second Reading in the House of Commons in December 2017. It will be debated next week on Monday February 5 and voted on February 7 to decide whether the Bill should pass Second Reading and move to Committee. • City of Toronto Budget Campaign and Homelessness Response

Toronto's city budget and homelessness crisis have been in the news of late. Recent developments at the Budget Committee and City Council have led to some good news in the short term regarding both the city's poverty reduction efforts and its response to the worsening homelessness crisis. • Nuclear Weapons Prohibition Treaty Petition

Jesus invites us to be peacemakers, and our baptismal vows call us to "strive for justice and peace among all people." In July 2017, 122 nations approved the UN Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons. The driving force behind the treaty was the International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons (ICAN), of which the Anglican Church of Canada is a member. ICAN won the Nobel Peace Prize for its efforts. However, the Canadian government has not yet signed the treaty. You can urge them to do so by signing this <u>petition</u> and sharing it with family and friends.
