1. Outreach & Advocacy Conference - Last Chance to Register! 3. Advocacy Campaigns: Have your Say!

• Ontario government consultation on Cap-and-Trade: The Ontario government has introduced legislation to cancel the cap-and-trade program, yet carbon pricing, either by means of a carbon tax or cap and trade, is the only market-based way to

reduce greenhouse gases. Not only that, but it creates incentives for companies to innovate, further stimulating the economy. **Before October 11, 2018**, take the time to submit your comment on the proposed legislation at the provincial government's link <u>here</u>.

- Speak out on Social Assistance: The Ontario government is also currently conducting a review of social assistance programs, to be completed by November 8. The Minister of Social Services, Lisa MacLeod, has said "we need to do more than just help people remain mired in poverty" and instead "help stabilize people in need and support them to succeed". We agree! Learn about measures that can help achieve that goal, and send a message to Minister MacLeod, by visiting this link.
- Tell Senators: Support the Rights of Indigenous Peoples! Bill C-262, an act to implement the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, has passed the House of Commons and is now before the Senate.
