- 1. Register NOW for our fall Outreach Conference! "Grounded and Growing in Christ: Church as a centre of resistance and hope" is the theme for this year's Outreach & Advocacy Conference, to be held on Saturday, October 19, 2019 at Havergal College in Toronto. With a keynote address from Thea Prescod of Sanctuary Ministries, Toronto and a diverse line-up of workshop presenters, we will explore ways in which churches can engage in faithful and creative ways to respond with hope and build community, in the face of inequality, injustice, and ecological breakdown. A special program is offered for Diocesan Youth. Tickets (\$30/\$15 students/youth/low-income) include a delicious hot lunch.
