1. LAST CHANCE to register for the Outreach & Advocacy Conference!

Our Outreach & Advocacy Conference, "Grounded and Growing in Christ: Church as a centre of resistance and hope," takes place on Saturday, October 19 from 9:30 to 3:30 at Havergal College, 1451 Avenue Rd. (south of Lawrence). The federal election takes place **Monday**, **October 21**, **2019**. Our Primate, the Most Rev. Linda Nicholls, together with the National Indigenous Archbishop and the National Bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada, have issued a <u>statement</u> calling Anglicans and Lutherans to use this election period as an opportunity to seek the general welfare of our nation. This **Thursday**, **October 3**, **2019 at 7:00 p.m.**, Citizens for Public Justice (CPJ)'s Fall Election Tour will provide a non-partisan look at major issues in the federal election. The

All-candidates' meetings are a great opportunity to ask the candidates of various parties about their platforms. Look for notice of all-candidates' meetings in your riding.

3. Uxbridge Poverty Coalition meeting, October 5. The fall meeting of the Uxbridge Poverty Coalition takes place on Saturday, Oct. 5 from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. at St. Paul's Church, 59 Toronto St. S., Uxbridge. The Rev. Christian Harvey, executive director of the Warming Room Community Ministries in Peterborough, will lead a session to focus the group's efforts on tangible outcomes for the community. Free, but please <u>register</u>.

4. Season of Creation at Redeemer. Church of the Redeemer is holding a series of events throughout October to mark the Season of Creation. The series begins on Sunday, October 6 at 7:00 p.m. with a service of music, sacred and secular readings, and prayer, along with guest preacher the Rt. Rev. Andrew Asbil. On Wednesday, October 16 at 7:00 p.m., join parishioner Paul Pynkowski for "Woods, Landscape, City: The Prophetic Spirituality of Thomas Merton." 6. Climate Truth and Reconciliation at Ascension, Port Perry, Oct. 7

On Monday, Oct. 7 from 4-5 p.m., Church of the Ascension (266 North St., Port Perry) will host speakers Ginny Colling and Deborah Pearson, who will explore the causes and impacts of the climate crisis on all of us, and especially on Indigenous communities. Free. All welcome.
