1. Vestry Motion 2020 - Taking Action on Climate Change. February is Vestry Season and, as is our practice, the Social Justice & Advocacy Committee has prepared a Social Justice Motion for consideration at your parish vestry meeting. This year's motion includes advocacy directed at the federal government on transitioning from fossil fuels to a decarbonized economy, as well as inviting parishes to reduce their own ecological footprint. The motion and supporting materials can be found on our Diocesan website. Don't forget to let us know the results of the motion in your parish!

2. Give It Up for the Earth! Lenten Postcard Campaign. As part of your parish response to the Vestry Motion, consider participating in this Lenten postcard campaign from Citizens for Public Justice. The <u>campaign</u> includes a postcard calling on the federal government to invest in a national just transition and decarbonization strategy, while committing to personal action to reduce carbon emissions. We have ordered a large number of postcards for distribution to Diocesan parishes: please <u>contact us</u> to get your postcards and materials.

3. Have your say on Ontario's Poverty Reduction Strategy. The provincial government has opened up consultations for the next five-year Poverty Reduction Strategy. You can participate in an <u>online survey</u> or send written submissions to <u>prso@ontario.ca</u> up to March 30, 2020.

4. Provincial Pre-Budget Submission. Our annual pre-budget brief was submitted to the provincial government last month, calling for action on income security, housing,

and climate change. You can read the full submission on the Diocesan <u>website</u>. A summary will also appear in the March edition of Anglican.
