

women's creativity

To quote the UNESCO website, "Women's creativity is unstoppable".

According to Google, a creative idea results when two or more notions come together in the mind in order to create a new notion. Using our creative thinking



Many of us do not consider ourselves to be creative, but we are!! How often as a mother, wife, sister, friend, volunteer, employee or employer have you had to deal with a delicate situation or problem? Creating a homey atmosphere for living, adjusting recipes to suit your taste, being a handcrafter or organizing a dinner/ luncheon for your church - all require your creativity.

What can we do to come up with new ideas? Various articles suggest the following techniques.

Brainstorming: This can be useful for small or large-scale problems that require a creative solution. The main goal is to gather a group of people to throw around ideas without interference. For it to work well, all participants must be aware of the problem that requires a creative solution and be familiar with how brainstorming works. Be sure to record all the ideas.

Lateral thinking: This involves looking in less obvious areas of reasoning. Try to put yourself in different perspectives or reverse the problem to look at it differently. The most important aspect of this process is to go where you would not usually choose to go, to imagine solutions that cannot be arrived at via logical means. Not relying on established patterns of thinking, paying attention to random stimulation, looking at alternative approaches and deliberately altering elements of available options (like doing the opposite of an implied direction or reversing any relationship) are all elements of lateral thinking.

Mind Mapping: A mind map is a chart/diagram where you input ideas and connect them. This process helps you connect ideas you never imagined could be combined. Because of that, it might help you reach appropriate solutions while using creative thinking skills. A mind map can serve as a way to see a bigger picture regarding what you are trying to do, and naturally reach conclusions.

Fundraising

Here are some fundraising ideas with tips on how-to. Use e-mail, telephone or however your parish communicates. Plant Sales can be tailored toward the seasonal celebrations (Easter, Christmas); the same applies to the Bake Sale.

Flowers/Plants Sale. Visit the websites or phone to request the fundraising program. Select a few plants from the list for simplicity, decide on prices. Advertise in your parish and/or local communication. Establish order, payment and (plant) pick-up dates. Start early to allow time for advertisement, to collect orders, plant delivery and pick-up. No-Bake Sale. Advertise to the parish about the No Bake Sale, asking for donations in the amount that would have been spent to bake or to buy baked items. Cheques should be made payable to the church, marked ACW.

Bake Sale. There are always those who love baking and those who like buying homemade baked goods! Contact the bakers in the parish asking them what they could provide. Send out a notice with a number of pre-set items available for purchase (e.g. butter tarts, lemon loaf, shortbread, pie, etc.) with prices. Orders are received with payment. Then the bakers are telephoned with their orders. Baked items are delivered at specific time to the church, sorted, and... picked up by purchasers at a different pre-arranged time

Work with a local bakery: One parish contacted a known bakery in their area about baking a specific item (shortbreads? butter tarts? cookies?) with how many they could supply at a certain date and at what cost. Cheese is another item that could work in an area where there is a "cheese producer". Advertise what is available and the price - increased price of course. Established specific pick-up date & times. One parish asked folks to "pay at one window/door/place" and "pick up at the other" similar to fast-food drive-through windows.

Anglican Foundation – "Say Yes to Kids"

At its November meeting, the AFC Board approved a campaign plan for Say Yes! to Kids 2022, setting a \$500,000 goal and introducing an innovative partnership model of fundraising. "Our hope is that this campaign will be both empowering and energizing," says Dr. Scott Brubacher, Executive Director, "enabling our churches to harness the power of peer-to-peer (P2P) fundraising to grow sustainable revenue streams for youth programs, while connecting them with other churches across Canada, as well as diocesan and national ministries, that are growing a brighter future for young people, today."

Michelle Hauser, AFC's Development and Communications Consultant says, "Any Anglican parish in Canada with a vision for outreach to young people is eligible to apply to form a fundraising team and campaign alongside like-minded parishes nationwide from April 1 to June 30." Hauser says teams will be able to set their own fundraising goals, and they will receive support with communications, case development, and training from AFC throughout the campaign. "Teams will also benefit from an AFC-led leadership giving campaign that will boost their efforts, including matching gifts."
