<u>100 Accomplished</u> Black Canadian Women 2022

Christ Church Stouffville recognizes the amazing achievement of parishioner, Hope Franklin, who was chosen as one of the 100 Accomplished Black Canadian Women for 2022.

Hope Franklin's over 40-year journey as a dedicated volunteer, can be traced back to her early days as a Girl Guide in Kingston, Jamaica, and continued in Canada as she worked as a Protection and Social Services worker and continued to volunteer for organizations helping women and victims of domestic abuse and as an ESL teacher for newcomers to Canada.

She is a founding member of Black History Month Committee for Christ Church, and has organized several educational events, speakers, and cultural celebrations, shining a bright light on the historical and contemporary contributions of Black women and girls for over two decades.

Chaplain's Reflection

Dear Friends in Christ

The theme of this year's Annual General Meeting is "Having Faith". The ancient meanings of faith are being used – faithfulness and trust. As Marcus Borg says in his book "*Speaking Christian*", faith "liberates us from anxiety" and "frees us for transformation in this life". "Faithfulness leads us to pay attention to our relationship to God".

The guest speaker for our AGM will be the Venerable Lydia Constant from the Henry Budd College for Ministry in The Pas, Manitoba. She has been involved at the College in various capacities since its founding in 1980. She will be interviewed by the Reverend Dr Kara Mandryk, Coordinator of the College, to talk about how, during her faith journey, she has related Christian tradition with her own culture. This is part of all the courses at the College. Lydia serves as the College elder and is a faculty member. Ordained in 1987, she has served in Parish ministry as well as ministry to the community. She also serves as a consulting elder in the Cree language for the Opaskwayak Educational Authority.

"Having Faith" can also be a focus for this year's Lenten journey. During Lent through prayer, charity and self-sacrifice (to reduce distractions and to focus more on God), we can focus on our need for God's forgiveness, repenting and receiving God's mercy and love. As we follow Christ's journey of His ministry and His path to the cross, His sacrifice on Good Friday and His resurrection on Easter can be even more meaningful.

Easter Greetings

Soon we will begin the journey to Easter Sunday. We will be bombarded with Easter eggs, chocolate bunnies, Easter egg hunts, and many other images and stories utterly irrelevant to the Easter message of Jesus' resurrection. The Bible contains no stories that tell of a long-eared cotton-tailed Easter Bunny, children painting eggs, or hunting for baskets overflowing with Easter goodies. Why are these traditions so ingrained in Easter, and what relevance do they have to Jesus' resurrection? Absolutely nothing!!! These all stem from pagan roots and were incorporated into the Easter celebration, entirely separate from Jesus' resurrection. I am not opposed to the game of hunting Easter eggs, and my children enjoyed such many times. Sometimes a gospel message was hidden in them with a little treat, but it was just a game!!!

Where and when did stories of "bunnies" become equated with Easter? The University of Florida's Center for Children's Literature and Culture states the origin of the Easter bunny can be traced to the 13th century, pre-Christian Germany, when people worshiped several gods and goddesses. Such legends and traditions were brought to the United States in the 1700s by German immigrants. The Teutonic deity Eostra was the goddess of spring and fertility, and feasts were held in her honour on the Vernal Equinox. Her symbol was the rabbit because of its high reproduction rate. Bunny legends were documented in the 1500s, and by 1680, stories of bunnies laying eggs and hiding them in gardens were published. Millions are spent at Easter to promote stories of "magical bunnies," stories that create fun and make many happy. Not a bad thing, but the problem is when these stories replace the real story.

During Christmas, stories of St. Nicholas are told, and as there was a real St. Nicholas, the story has meaning and truth. Jesus told stories called parables, allegorically designed to illustrate or teach a reality, truth, or spiritual lesson. In the stories, concrete objects were often used to represent an abstract meaning. For example, Jesus often used small everyday objects common and contextual to the culture, such as seeds in the earth, a pearl inside an oyster, a buried treasure, or a lamp under a bushel, to impart the message of hope, love and faith in people. Jesus was an amazing storyteller. His stories are compelling and are an integral part of our past and form our future. Even though I enjoy the legends and stories of our culture, I need to know, hear, and depend on true stories, such as stories Jesus shared, lived and spoke throughout his ministry. The Bible stories that tell of the Saviour's coming birth, death and resurrection, are stories that change lives. We are changed by telling and sharing the stories of Jesus' teachings, love and presence, simply and meaningfully, through the rhythms of our everyday lives. And when we tell these stories, the fulfillment of "Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth, as it is in heaven" comes closer. PS: Just saying!! Bunnies don't lay eggs!!

You will need a pipe cleaner (or heavy yarn), 1 large bead and 8 small ones Thread 4 beads on the pipe cleaner. Add a large centre bead. Then add the remaining 4 beads. WHAT HAS CHANGED? (from Archives)

In reading the article "Focus on Anglican Church Women" in the Toronto WA Bulletin from May 1967, I asked myself "Has anything really changed in the last 56 years?". Very little it seems. We still are challenged with change, renewal, flexibility, social concern and action, spiritual needs, using our full potential, mutual support.

Here are quotes from the bulletin.

If Anglican Church Women is to justify supplanting the existing organizations for women in the Church, it will have to acknowledge the right of every woman to develop her full potential. This means granting her freedom to choose whether she lives the Christian life within the institutional structure of the Church or outside the structure. (Mrs. Salter, President)

The ACW must insert itself in all areas of human spiritual needs and we must make a responsible response to change. (Mrs. Fowle, W.A.)

Although the Chancel Guild is a highly specialized work which should be a deeply spiritual experience, if members are to witness, they must be flexible and outgoing and ready to adapt. The hope is that members of the Chancel Guild will take their place in the diocese with Anglican Church Women which will take part in the whole mission of the Church. (Miss Gray, Chancel Guild)

As women of the church we must adapt to change. "How can we strengthen one another?" She suggested that we must have prayer groups, study groups and discussions to explore all stages of family life. We must continually assess how to challenge women. (Mrs. Corras, Mother's Union)

We were reminded that our new organization should be centred in Renewal; we must look out and see where Christian love can be taken into the world; we need to be well informed; we are concerned about the problems around us.

Prayer shawls have been gifted to members of the parish and to many in the Cobourg community. Our great joy has been to give prayer shawls and baby blankets to the mothers and babies at the baptisms held during the year. This past summer, prayer shawls were given to the recently arrived Ukrainian mothers whose children were attending an English Bible camp.

Members of this team have also been knitting and recruiting creative hands to create mitts and hats for our partners at Transition House who will provide the items to guests using St Peter's warming room during the cold months.

Recently, the Women of St. Peter's hosted a Women of Faith Gathering, *What's in a Name*. Over 60 women enjoyed a delicious continental breakfast and enjoyed Fran Richardson's Presentation, "Many Marys". Participants donated money to support our Knitting Ministry or food items to support our Thursday Night Light Community Dinner.



St James, Orillia

30 Christmas Cheer token gifts were prepared and delivered to Pastoral Care for delivery to their parishioner list. (shut-ins, hospitalizations, seniors homes, etc).

A new venture was undertaken this year in partnership with the Pennywise Shoppe (our thrift store) - a Fashion Show and High Tea. The Pennywise Shoppe provided ensembles and arranged for the models. The ACW arranged for sandwiches, baked goodies, tea, and servers.

St Nick's Shopping Day returned this year. This is a morning available for children 12 and under to shop for Christmas presents for their family, all by themselves, with no family adults in the room. "Elves" helped the wee little ones with their lists, and all items cost from \$0.10 to \$2.50.

Our annual Christmas Wish Gift Project continued this year. 24 families comprising of 100 individuals (68 children and 32 adults) were accepted. Fundscript cards were ordered from (3) grocery stores, as well as Walmart.

St. Mary's, Richmond Hill

Our Christmas Market was held on Saturday, November 19, 2022. Our first in-person event since the pandemic was a huge success. Our luncheon was sold out, our shoppers came ready to shop and our volunteers are the best. Our sales tables were: Baking, Sewing, Knitting, Plants & Urns, Christmas Décor & Gifts, Jewelry, Raffle, Kids activities, a Luncheon and Poinsettia sales. We donated funds to five groups within our parish including the private sponsorship of a refugee family and outreach to seven groups in our community also including the Toronto Diocesan ACW and the Memorial Book.
